A New Home for Doug

Congratulations! You helped provide a home for Doug Schmidt who lost nearly everything in a tornado 16 months ago. You have given him a warm and safe place to live that he is extremely grateful for.

This Partnership Home Project (PHP) started approximately two years ago with some casual conversation about how this Mennonite Disaster Service (MDS) program seemed to fit our congregation. Several of us became excited with the information we received and the opportunities it would provide for our entire congregation. The planning began and several other churches were asked to join us in building a new home. Sunnyside Mennonite agreed to participate with volunteers and fundraising efforts.

You can look at the numbers and realize it was a task that involved many people in numerous ways. It started with six people on the committee who planned a fund raiser. Then many others donated or bought items to the fundraiser. On June 6th we built the walls at CHI with at least twenty five volunteers combined from both churches. The home was started at the site in Pilger on June 15th and dedicated on October 2nd. During that time there were seven trips made to Nebraska with a total of nineteen volunteers from the two churches. The total number of volunteers who worked on the house was around fifty which includes some volunteers from

Nebraska that were not from our congregations. The total number of hours put in at the home site by Sunnyside and Arthur Mennonite volunteers was around nine hundred. Total funds raised by both congregations were almost sixteen thousand dollars. A big "Thank You" goes to anyone who helped in any way to make this possible. The numbers are nice but, they're not the main story.

The main story is that everyone involved became the hands and feet of Jesus to Doug Schmidt. Doug continually thanked the volunteers verbally and in other ways. He always had water, coffee and other drinks along with snacks at the build site.

Doug took volunteers out for lunch sometimes and provided a wonderful meal after the dedication. He shared about his experience during the tornado and the feelings he experienced after the destruction. We spent time talking and becoming friends. Doug prayed for us just as we prayed for him. Several comments that I heard Doug say more than once were: "this is my mansion," "I can't ever thank you enough," "I am the most blessed man in Pilger," and "God gave me the best crew." He also mentioned that he was excited about being able to have the family over for Christmas this year. On our final day there Doug mentioned the possibility of coming to Arthur sometime to thank

For the past decade our church has celebrated Christ the King on the Friday or Saturday night before Christ the King Sunday is observed on the liturgical church calendar. This year the Ministry Team has decided to try something different. We are going to celebrate Christ the King Sunday on Sunday, November 22nd during the morning Christian Education and Worship time.

You may be asking, "What is Christ the King Sunday anyway?" It is the last Sunday of the church calendar year, set aside as a time to give thanks and celebrate God's church established through his Son Jesus Christ. Many churches around the world celebrate this. Yes, He is the King and our lives should testify that Jesus is the Lord of our life. During the 10:30 worship celebration we will be sharing a special time of communion and other things that help us to celebrate Jesus Christ and His Church. There will also be a noon fellowship meal. I hope that you will plan to join us that Sunday. Thank you for all that you do to make this church of Jesus Christ here at Arthur Mennonite Church a light on the hill and salt for the earth. Many people serving Christ our King in so many different ways is definitely something to be celebrated!

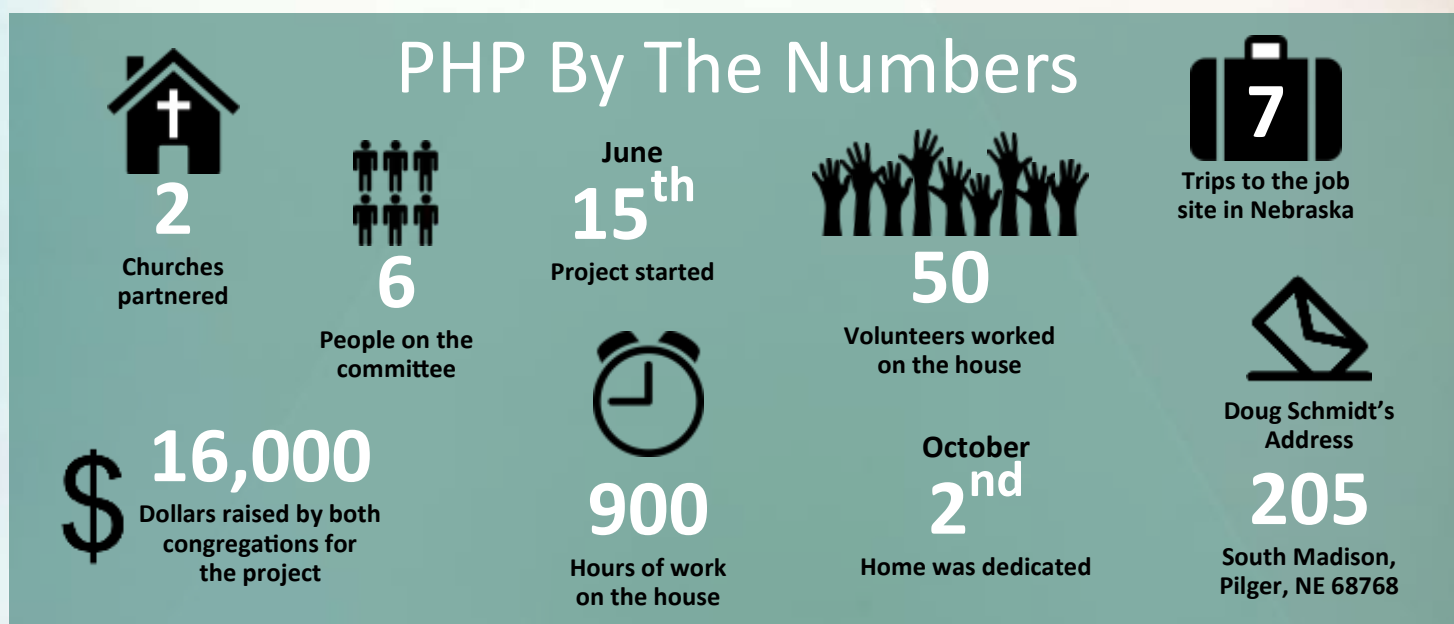
everyone for the generosity shown to him.

The Discipline of Worship

As we look at the corporate discipline of worship, it is a direct expression of our ultimate purpose for living, Isaiah 43:6-7 says: *I will say to the north, give up, and to the south, do not withhold bring my sons from afar and my daughters from the end of the earth everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made.*



Just meditating on the fact that the Lord God made you and me is amazing in itself! But that he bore our sins also! Think about this: the average human body has more than 60,000 miles of blood vessels, for every pound of fat gained your body makes up 7 miles of new blood vessels. I am grateful that it is God who sustains, and protects us, that's the God I want to worship.

When we come into this sweet relationship, we are beginning to learn astonished reverence, breathless adoration, awesome fascination, lofty admiration of the attributes of God, which adds up to what the Bible calls the "fear of God." I believe that the Reverential fear of God mixed with the love, fascination, astonishment, admiration and devotion is the most enjoyable state and the most purifying emotion the human soul can know.

What does God do when we worship him? The amazing truth of Scripture is that as the creation glorifies God, he also takes delight in it (see Genesis 1:31). God takes special delight in human beings he has created and redeemed.

Because God is worthy of worship and seeks to be worshiped, everything in our worship services should be designed and carried out not to call attention to ourselves, lest we steal his worship, but to call attention to God and to cause people to think about him. Peter says that spiritual gifts are to be used in such a way that *"in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ"* 1 Peter 4:11.

We are called in Mark 12:30 to *Love the Lord your God with all your heart with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.* Not only is this a call to worship God with your mind, will, and emotions but also physically, your strength. So when I sing along, saying the words, but thinking about what's for lunch, or my problems at work, I am not really worshipping. At best I only appear to be worshipping.

I challenge you to give God your best focused attention when worshipping whether it be in corporate worship or private worship, and he will reward you immensely.
