

Travel Journal: Youth Mission Trip 2016

In June the AMC Youth embarked on a nine day trip to Denver, Colorado where they worked with the DOOR Program. They will be sharing about their experiences during a dedicated worship celebration on July 17th. Here is a look at each day of their journey through the eyes of a different traveler each day.

Day 1: Saturday, June 18th-Travel / Kansas We did a scavenger hunt around [Hesston College] campus. Then we had pizza in the library for dinner because it was raining. There, we also played some fun games as a group. Then we went on a walk in the arboretum which was beautiful!-Lexi Burnett

Day 2: Sunday, June 19th-Travel Day Today...I learned that yes after a total of 16 hours and about 1660 miles, I can survive in a van with 8 others. Today, we arrived in Denver and I saw God's beautiful creation through the mountains as we drove into

Denver. We went shopping, out to dinner, and then headed to First Mennonite of Denver to start our service for the week. We met some of the DOOR leaders and the other youth group and I can already tell this is going to be a great week of serving & learning. -Meredith Schrock

Day 3: Monday, June 20th-Colorado Today, I went to KADEP [King Adult Day Enrichment Program]. KADEP is a place where people with MS or brain trauma can go and have a good time with others and enjoy themselves. They arrive and have free time, then have an activity, then lunch, and then other activities after lunch. The clients are very welcoming and they love seeing everybody around them. I enjoyed being at KADEP and being around the clients. -Michelle Schrock

Day 4: Tuesday, June 21st-Colorado

Today, I went with my group to the Bus Stop Ministry and the Network Café. At our first stop, we listened to a woman named Mary give a sermon about how we need to be optimistic through God's word and not through the things that happen to us. We served the people who are homeless breakfast and then we went to the Café.



At Network Café, we heard another woman named Camille. Her sermon was about how Satan doesn't have control of us. The thoughts in our heads are in our control; we decide what we think or feel about ourselves. After her sermon, we just hung out with the people and played games or talked to them. Everyone was happy and wanted to talk to us. They really seemed to enjoy having us there. Jimmy (who led/helped us) told us stories of his life and how he became a Christian. He also played us some of his songs on his guitar.

That night for supper we did a Solidarity supper. We had to go out in Denver with no money and get a meal. Kim & I paired up and went to find food. We met a man who is homeless named Pete who was kind enough to give us some of his food. He told us about his life and about what it is like to be without a home in Denver. While we were talking, he brought up that he had been reading Proverbs in the bible. Kim told him how much God loves him and protects him. She gave him some passages to look up and we said goodbye. Kim & I walked on 16th Street, asked some women for change for food and finally went into a fresh food market where a worker let us get salads for free. We shared our salads with the rest of the group when we met up with them. I think that experiencing life as a homeless person (even for only 2 hours) was eye opening for me. It made me realize that it is more difficult than expected to get a good meal if you have to ask for money or ask for free food. Many people are not willing to help and some just cannot help. This day gave me a new outlook on the lives of people who are homeless. I will try -Regina Miller very hard to never judge anyone again.

God's Leisurely Providence

In many of our prayers to God we say the words "and your will be done." How much do we mean that? I am currently reading a wonderful book by Eugene Peterson entitled "Run With the Horses, The Quest for Life at its Best" that considers the life of the prophet Jeremiah and the book that he wrote in the Old Testament.

This is how the inside cover describes this book, "We all long to live life at its best, to fuse freedom and spontaneity with purpose and meaning. Why then do we often find our lives so humdrum, so unadventuresome, so routine? Or else so frantic, so full of activity, but still devoid of fulfillment? How do we learn to risk, to trust, to pursue wholeness and excellence, to run with the horses in the jungle of life? In a series of profound reflections on the life of Jeremiah the prophet, Eugene Peterson explores the heart of what it means to be fully and genuinely human."

In one of the chapters this quote caught my attention. He writes, "Our compulsive timetables collide with God's leisurely providence. We tell God not only what to do but when to do it. We take him seriously, why else would we be praying? But we take ourselves more seriously, telling him exactly what he must do for us and when."

That takes me back to the first question I asked. Do we really mean that we want God's will to be done, or would we prefer that our will would be blessed by God? I believe that this caught my attention because I often pray for the Lord's will to be done. I believe that is a correct way to pray and I believe that it is a biblical way to pray, but do I believe it and want it with all of my heart?


Sometimes God takes much longer than I would prefer. Sometimes God's will is not what I had in mind. Sometimes God's will is hard for me to understand. But ultimately it is the Lord's providence that is always best. Perhaps that is something we all need to be reminded of from time to time? As we pray, let's pray for the Lord's will to be done, then may we truly submit to the Lord's will and give up our own. Jeremiah learned that this was not always easy but he also learned that God would bless those who fully rely on him. My encouragement is for all of us to do the same. "Lord God, may your will be done!"

CONFESSION OF FAITH IN A MENNONITE PERSPECTIVE

Article 7 ~ Sin

Editors Note: This is the seventh in a monthly series. Each month we will include one of the twenty four articles from the Confession of Faith in a Mennonite Perspective so that we can all be refreshed in what they express.

We confess that, beginning with Adam and Eve, humanity has disobeyed God, given way to the tempter, and chosen to sin. Because of sin, all have fallen short of the Creator's intent, marred the image of God in which they were created,



disrupted order in the world, and limited their love for others. Because of sin, humanity has been given over to the enslaving powers of evil and death.

Sin is turning away from God and making gods of creation and of ourselves. We sin by making individual and group choices to do unrighteousness and injustice. We sin by omitting to do good and neglecting to give God the glory due our Creator and Redeemer. In sinning, we become unfaithful to the covenant with God and with God's people, destroy right relationships, use power selfishly, do violence, and become separated from God. As a result, we are not able to worship God rightly.

Through sin, the powers of domination, division, destruction, and death have been unleashed in humanity and in all of creation. They have, in turn, further subjected human beings to the power of sin and evil, and have increased burdensome work and barren rest. The more we sin, the more we become trapped in sin. By our sin we open ourselves to the bondage of demonic powers. Because of sin and its consequences, the efforts of human beings on their own to do the good and to know the truth are constantly corrupted.

The enslaving nature of sin is apparent in the powers of evil, which work through both individuals and groups and in the entire created order. These powers, principalities, and elemental spirits of the universe often hold people captive and work through political, economic, social, and even religious systems to turn people away from justice and righteousness. But thanks be to God, who has not allowed the powers to reign supreme over creation or left humanity without hope.




Stories from My Life as an Amish Mother
