# ¡Saludos desde Ecuador! (Greetings from Ecuador!)

I hope everyone is doing well after getting through another Illinois winter. Brutal winter weather definitely is something I have dealt with in Ecuador, as it typically remains in the mid-60s here year round. I definitely did not miss winter in Illinois!

In addition to the weather, there are many other aspects of Ecuador that I am really enjoying. The aspect I am enjoying the most is teaching. I am teaching English at a university in Quito,

but students from other universities and high schools, as well as community members can enroll in the language courses, so the ages of my students have ranged from 16-34. Overall, the students are very respectful and most have a strong desire to learn English in order to study abroad, teach English, conduct business with Englishspeaking customers, and/or gain more job opportunities within Ecuador and abroad. Instead of teaching in semesters, we teach in cycles, which last for eight weeks. I have just started my third teaching cycle, and just have one more after this one before I return back to the U.S. Hopefully, my work and teaching will help them have better lives and aid in Ecuador's overall economic development.

Another aspect of Ecuador that I really appreciate is





the people. From my host family, to my students, to my Ecuadorian friends, the majority of people in Ecuador are very nice, welcoming and giving. Within the Ecuadorian culture, there is a high importance placed on family and community, and this can be observed in everyday life. For example, it is typical for a child to live with their parents until they get married, and even after they get married, they still visit their parents often.

In the case of my host family, I live with the grandparents, and their

grandchildren come over every day after school, and then almost every night their family comes over for dinner. Even though I am not a member of their family by blood, they still include me like I am a part of the family. For instance...they had a birthday dinner for me, have invited me to family parties, and when people from home have come to visit me, they have invited them over for dinner. I have been just as welcomed into the families of my Ecuadorian friends as well. I have really come to admire how Ecuadorians take care of their family and also give to others as if they were family.

I have also appreciated being able to find community not just with Ecuadorians, but also with Christians from other countries. Soon after arriving in Ecuador, I attended the Mennonite church where the Wiggintons are missionaries...
