

## A Sweet Aroma by Nancy Kuhns, Minister of Community Life

According to Heidi Godman, Executive Editor, Harvard Health Letter, your smell sense gives you a superpower. Without moving a muscle or opening your eyes, your sense of smell helps you detect danger, store or trigger memories, discern flavors, or get a rush of feel-good chemicals during a meal. We all know that smelling smoke or natural gas in our homes indicates danger. We use our sense of smell to determine if food in our refrigerator is still good. We have also experienced memories based on smell – the aroma of fresh baked bread or cookies may take us back to our grandmother's kitchen, the smell of peppermint may remind us of the candy our grandfather always carried in his pocket, and the smell of a just bathed baby reminds us of our children's smell just out of the bath. Some studies have shown that the smell of a food accounts for up to 80 percent of how we perceive flavor, compared to 20 percent for taste. One of my grandsons often bases what food he will eat based on how it smells. If it doesn't smell good, there is no way he is going to eat it!! We use candles and wax melts to fill our homes with a pleasant aroma and we may have a signature cologne, perfume, or lotion to ensure that we smell good. Conversely, we could also name unpleasant odors – the smell of skunk or a dead mouse, the smell of rotten meat, and the damp, musty smell of a closed up basement. These are the odors we want to get away from quickly!!

In The Pocket Bible Devotional for Women, Norma Rossouw began a devotional much as I began this article by writing of pleasant and unpleasant odors. hen she made it personal by writing, "What is the scent you leave behind you after you disagreed with people, next to the field where your child is playing sports, on the road, or behind your computer?" (Or at the coffee shop or out to lunch or dinner with friends, or at work.) That sentence caught my attention!! I had never thought of what I leave behind me by my words and actions as a scent. Did you know the Bible speaks of the aroma that we, as Christians, are to have? In 2 Corinthians 2:14-16 (Message paraphrase) Paul writes, "In the Messiah, in Christ, God leads us from place to place in one perpetual victory parade. Through us, he brings knowledge of Christ. Everywhere we go, people breathe in the exquisite fragrance. Because of Christ, we give off a sweet scent rising to God, which is

But those on the way to destruction treat us more like the stench from a rotting corpse." What leaves behind a stench? Gossip, hatred, criticism, judgement. Do we want to be known for that? What leaves behind a pleasing scent? Love, kindness, patience, encouragement, understanding. Ephesians 5:2 says, "Live a life filled with love, following the example of Christ. He loved us and offered Himself as a sacrifice for us, a pleasing aroma to God." By striving to become more Christlike in our thoughts, words, and actions, we will leave behind us the sweet aroma of Christ. Isn't that what we want to be known for? Leave an aroma of life and love!
